When you go to The Malayan Council, you have to get this cake. Even if you are so full that you cannot eat any more, just stuff this in your mouth.

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See the coconut flakes on the outside! This cake is not overly sweet. The gula melaka is layered with the soft and moist pandan sponge cake. Sedap lah!

But cannot everyone eat the same cake right?

Why cannot?

Ok, so it is time to try other cakes from The Malayan Council. Maybe there are some other hidden gems.

So what I did was to go to The Malayan Council at Dunlop Street and order just about all the varieties of cakes they had on offer.

Ranking The Malayan Council cakes in order of personal preference, Ondeh Ondeh is the undisputed champion.

Coming in second is the Putu Piring flavour.

You know when you hear that the cake is putu piring flavoured and you do not know what to expect? Well, it really tastes like putu piring. It is flaky on top of being soft. Its sweetness is light and refreshing. I would say this comes a very close second to their ondeh ondeh flavoured cake. You think it would be weird but it truly is not.

2. Chocolate Ovomaltine
