



Chicken Little at SRT: Match the Show to Your Child

Description

SRT's English Chicken Little runs at Drama Centre Theatre until 29 August 2026, lasts about 60 minutes without an intermission and is recommended for ages three and above. The best family choice depends less on the story title than on the child's ability to sit through the duration, handle theatre sound and follow the admission rules.

The practical task is to match age, language, duration, seating and sensory needs to a specific performance. A sound decision separates the controlling condition from convenience, then records the evidence before money, travel, work or a deadline makes the choice harder to reverse.

Match the decision to the situation

Your child is three or older and theatre-ready

Choose a time that avoids usual nap or meal conflicts. Confirm the condition before treating that route as settled.

Sensory flexibility matters

Check the relaxed performance and visual-story options. Confirm the condition before treating that route as settled.

A booster seat is needed

Arrive early because availability is not guaranteed. Confirm the condition before treating that route as settled.

The child is likely to need breaks

Choose an aisle strategy and understand re-entry guidance. Confirm the condition before treating that route as settled.

Use duration honestly

[SRT Chicken Little production page](#) states the controlling point used here: English dates, 60-minute duration, age recommendation, pricing, venue, access performance and admission rules. Sixty minutes without an interval can be long for a first theatre visit. Compare it with the child's current seated attention.

For use duration honestly, this becomes consequential when • Your child is three or older and theatre-ready • applies. The next move is to choose a time that avoids usual nap or meal conflicts, but only after the underlying condition has been verified and dated.

Choose language and date

The English run is separate from the earlier Mandarin performances. Confirm the selected performance language.

For choose language and date, record the result as confirmed, pending or not applicable. If it is still pending, do not let a convenient assumption close the gap; identify the person or service that can resolve it and the last safe time to ask.

Read the age rule

Recommendation and ticket requirement are separate questions. Check admission terms for every child.

For read the age rule, this becomes consequential when • A booster seat is needed • applies. The next move is to arrive early because availability is not guaranteed, but only after the underlying condition has been verified and dated.

Plan sensory support

[SRT Chicken Little activity pack](#) states the controlling point used here: Official pre-visit activities and story context can help families prepare without claiming a performance review. The production lists a relaxed performance and visual story for patrons who benefit. Contact the box office early.

For plan sensory support, record the result as confirmed, pending or not applicable. If it is still pending, do not let a convenient assumption close the gap; identify the person or service that can resolve it and the last safe time to ask.

Arrive before seating

SRT advises patrons to be seated 15 minutes before start, and late entry occurs only at a suitable time. Work backward from curtain time.

For arrive before seating, this becomes consequential when Your child is three or older and theatre-ready• applies. The next move is to choose a time that avoids usual nap or meal conflicts, but only after the underlying condition has been verified and dated.

Prepare without spoilers if preferred

The activity pack can build familiarity, while a visual story may reveal plot details. Choose the preparation level that suits the child.

For prepare without spoilers if preferred, record the result as confirmed, pending or not applicable. If it is still pending, do not let a convenient assumption close the gap; identify the person or service that can resolve it and the last safe time to ask.

A child-readiness checklist covering duration, sound, seating and breaks

Start with Use duration honestly, then test Choose language and date and Read the age rule. Show the input, the condition applied and the resulting action in separate columns. If a number is calculated, retain the arithmetic; if a route is selected, retain the branch that ruled out the alternative.

Use Plan sensory support, Arrive before seating and Prepare without spoilers if preferred as the verification pass. Check the live condition, note the time checked and keep the response or document that supports the conclusion. Unknowns remain visible until resolved; they should not be replaced by a guessed price, deadline, eligibility result, service level or operating detail.

Worked example

A four-year-old usually naps at 1pm and becomes unsettled in dark rooms. A 2pm show may be a poor fit even though the age recommendation is met. The parent could choose an 11am performance, ask about the visual story or relaxed option and arrive early for seating. Suitability turns on the child, not

age alone.

The example is a calculation or decision model, not a guarantee. Change one material input at a time, preserve the original inputs and recheck the live authority or operator page before relying on the result.

Before you commit

1. Choose a time that avoids usual nap or meal conflicts.
2. Check the relaxed performance and visual-story options.
3. Arrive early because availability is not guaranteed.
4. Choose an aisle strategy and understand re-entry guidance.
5. Save the date and evidence used for every material condition.
6. Stop and ask the controlling authority, operator or qualified professional if a disputed fact changes the outcome.

Match the child or household to the duration, sensory setting, access rule, timing and exit option. A published age recommendation is useful, but it does not replace the family's own readiness assessment.

This is a planning guide, not a review of the performance or an assessment of a child. Ticket availability and access arrangements can change.
