The HAN is an NHB initiative which seeks to provide opportunities for the community to participate in and co-develop projects aimed at celebrating the heritage of their neighbourhoods.








Oh, and itâ??s a collaboration with Ngee Ann Polytechnic.

Oh and the students came up with a board game, sort of, on the wall in the corner of the Clementi Community Library.








Now for the tour around Clementi.






I like the way the tours by the NHB are run. They give you these receivers with an earpiece. The presenter can be a few metres away and you can hear what he or she is presenting.

This is a mural done by the students. So many people walk past this en route to Clementi MRT Station.







Perhaps scan the QR code to learn more about the mural?









I can share some of the checkpoints but I should not say more. Want to learn about these landmarks? Join their tour!






Oh this shop is almost as old as I am. It has been here since the 1980s.

The tour includes knowing the people who run these businesses in the area.



This curry puff is very popular.






A test shot with the HONOR Magic V3. Looks appetising enough? Looks thin and fluffy.






This is another popular stall.
