



Scoot Flights To Guiyang: Singapore's New Direct Route From S\$158

Description

Scoot flights to Guiyang launch on 26 October 2026, making the Guizhou provincial capital the airline's 17th city in mainland China and giving Singapore a direct route to a part of southwest China most of us have never had reason to fly to. The airline confirmed the new service on 20 August 2026, alongside a wider round of frequency increases across its network for the year-end travel season. One-way Economy fares start from S\$158, taxes included, and bookings are open now.

If Guiyang does not ring a bell, you are not alone. It rarely makes the shortlist next to Chengdu or Kunming, and that is exactly why it is worth a proper look before the flights fill up.

The Scoot Flights To Guiyang Route, In Numbers

Scot will fly the route three times a week using its Airbus A320neo aircraft, starting 26 October 2026. That date is not random. It lines up with the start of Scoot's Northern Winter 2026/2027 schedule, which runs from 25 October 2026 to 27 March 2027 and brings capacity increases across the network, not just this one new city.

- **Route:** Singapore Changi to Guiyang Longdongbao International Airport, three times weekly.
- **Start date:** 26 October 2026.
- **Aircraft:** Airbus A320neo.
- **Fares:** from S\$158 one-way, Economy Class, taxes included.
- **Booking:** open now via the Scoot website and app, with other channels to follow.

With Guiyang added, Scoot now runs 81 weekly flights to 16 cities across mainland China, and its total network grows to 86 destinations across 18 countries and territories in the Asia-Pacific, Middle East and Europe. This is not a one-off route addition either. Scoot's Chief Executive Officer Leslie Thng framed it as part of the airline's steady year-on-year capacity growth heading into the year-end season.

Why Guiyang Is Actually Worth The Detour

Guiyang sits in the heart of Guizhou province, a part of China known for karst mountains and deep gorges. The climate runs noticeably cooler than most destinations Singaporeans fly to for a China trip. It has earned the nickname 'the world's canyon capital' in Chinese tourism circles for good reason.

- **Qingyan Ancient Town:** one of China's better-preserved historic towns, roughly 40 minutes from the city centre, with Ming and Qing dynasty architecture still intact.
- **Huangguoshu Waterfall:** one of the largest waterfalls in Asia, a scenic two-hour drive southwest of Guiyang and easily the region's headline attraction.
- **Cooler weather:** Guiyang's elevation keeps summer temperatures noticeably milder than Singapore's, which is part of why it is nicknamed China's 'forest city' and a favourite domestic summer escape.

None of this has had the marketing budget that Chengdu's pandas or Guilin's rivers get, which is precisely the appeal if you are tired of doing the same three China itineraries every other Singaporean has already posted about.

The Other Routes Getting More Flights This Winter

Guiyang is the headline, but Scoot is quietly adding capacity across a string of routes Singaporeans already fly often. If your usual holiday spot is on this list, expect it to be easier to get a decent flight time from October.

- **Hat Yai:** up from 12 to 14 times weekly.
- **Phuket:** up from 17 to 21 times weekly.
- **Clark:** up from seven to 10 times weekly, from December 2026.
- **Kota Kinabalu:** up from 10 to 13 times weekly, from January 2027.
- **Okinawa:** up from four to five times weekly. We covered the direct Okinawa route in more detail in our [Scoot Okinawa flights guide](#).
- **Tiruchirappalli:** up from 12 to 14 times weekly, from December 2026.
- **Phu Quoc:** staying at daily flights, but gradually upgauged from the Embraer E190-E2 to the Airbus A320 family for more seats per flight.

All of this sits under Scoot's Northern Winter 2026/2027 schedule, so treat late October as the real turning point if you are watching seat availability rather than just fares.

Booking The Guiyang Route: What To Check First

Before you lock in dates, a few practical things are worth checking, since this is a new route and schedules can shift closer to launch.

1. Confirm your visa requirements for China well ahead of travel. Rules and visa-free arrangements have changed more than once in the past two years, so check the current position rather than relying on your last China trip.
2. Book directly through Scoot's website or app for the new route, since other booking channels are still being progressively rolled out.
3. Remember flight schedules remain subject to government and regulatory approvals, so keep an eye on your booking confirmation for any adjustments before October.
4. If you are chasing the S\$158 opening fare, that is typically the lowest fare bucket and tends to move fastest once a route is announced.
